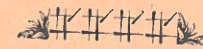

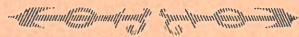

Courses of Study.

The following Courses of Study are now established ; others will be added as required.

THEOLOGICAL COURSE.

The pressing need of educated ministers throughout the South has led to the establishment of this course.

Three lines of study are pursued, the aim being :

*First.*—To become familiar with the leading Facts of the Bible; Facts of Geography, History, Chronology, Biography, with special reference to the lives of the Apostles and of Christ, Ancient Covenants, Typical Jewish Institutions, Messianic Prophecies, Harmony of the Gospels, Miracles and Parables, Events of the Passion Week, Planting of the early Christian Church among the Gentiles, Biblical view of the Christian Doctrines, with Proof-Texts and Exegesis, Biblical Archæology.

*Second.*—To understand the system of Christian Theology; the Existence and Perfection of God, Inspiration of the Bible, Trinity, Divine Decrees, Providence, Will, Nature of Holiness and Sin, Apostasy, Depravity, Atonement, Regeneration, Justification by Faith, Perseverance of the Saints, Eschatology, Positive Institutions.

*Third.*—To become acquainted with, and established in, the best Methods of Christian Work; Preaching, Pastoral and Mission Work, Prayer Meetings, Reform Societies, Agencies of Beneficence, Planting of Churches, Bible Study.

Pupils pursuing the Normal Course are allowed to take one study in Theology, during the last two years of their Normal studies, thus enabling them to complete the Theological Course one year sooner than they otherwise would.

Most of the students in the course perform mission work in the surrounding country, for which they receive a small compensation, thus enabling them to continue their studies without becoming involved in debt.



Tuition and the use of the library are free.

Persons pursuing this course may receive instruction in the other courses at one-half the usual rates.

Those having the necessary education, and who devote their entire time to it, can finish their course in three years; others remain longer.

Candidates for admission to the *regular course* in this department, must furnish satisfactory evidence of moral character, and of such scholarship as will enable them to successfully pursue the prescribed studies.

### COLLEGE PREPARATORY COURSE.

For admission, students must be thoroughly prepared in Reading, Writing, Spelling, English Grammar and Analysis, Geography, Arithmetic, and United States History.

Students from abroad must pass satisfactory examination in the above studies before they will be admitted.

None but those who expect to complete the course will be allowed to begin it.

Punctuality at opening of the terms, regularity, constant attendance upon recitations, and thoroughness of scholarship are the conditions of continuance.

The completion of this course is intended to prepare students to teach in the most advanced schools in the South.

To meet the growing demand for better teachers, special attention is given to Normal work proper. Lectures on the Theory and Practice of Teaching are given by different members of the Faculty. A series of TEACHERS' INSTITUTES has been begun, affording those who engage in teaching a rare opportunity to become familiar with the best methods of instruction.

Students expecting to enter upon this course must bring certificates of character, and, if from other schools, of honorable dismissal.

To be admitted, students must pass satisfactory examination in Elementary Geography, the four fundamental rules of Written Arithmetic, and be able to read well in the Third Reader.

Promotions are made only as each subject is thoroughly mastered.

## PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.

Hitherto this department has been a necessity; and the time has not yet come when it can be dispensed with. It will be continued as long as there is urgent need for it. The studies pursued are elementary and may soon be completed. They include the beginning of Reading, Writing, Spelling, Elementary Arithmetic, and Geography.

To enter the next higher Department students must be able to read well in the Third Reader, and understand thoroughly the fundamental rules of Written Arithmetic, and the Elementary Geography.

## INDUSTRIAL DEPARTMENTS.

These departments were organized for a two-fold purpose:

FIRST: To give practical instruction in the best methods of doing work.

SECOND: To enable students of limited means to pay a part of their expenses in labor, thus developing in them a spirit of self-reliance. While the College will not *make* work merely for the purpose of giving employment to students, it will furnish all the labor it consistently can

Early application will be necessary to secure aid. Those who apply late must be satisfied with what they can get. *In no case should any one come, hoping to receive such aid, unless such person has applied for it and received a favorable answer.* Attention to this statement may save time, trouble, and disappointment. Applicants should state the degree of advancement in their studies, their necessities, and *the amount which they can promptly pay.* In no case will industrial students be allowed to run behind in their accounts. This must be distinctly understood.

Faithfulness, promptness, and efficiency in the performance of all labor will be exacted from each one.

It is earnestly hoped that all will come prepared to pay as much as possible, in order that they may have the more time to devote to study and self-improvement.

## AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT.

WINSTED FARM contains one hundred and sixty acres, lying about one mile from the College Buildings. There are also about forty acres adjacent to the buildings, used partly for gardening purposes.

The proceeds of the farm and garden are sold or used in the Boarding Department and the Agricultural Department credited accordingly. A few young men secure regular "jobs" for which they are allowed a certain sum monthly. Others work by the hour and *are paid according to the value of the work done.* Young men without money, but desirous of obtaining an education, can usually find employment on the farm until they have earned enough to enable them to go to school a part, or a whole of the year. The long summer vacation affords the best time to do this.

As yet no course of study in Agriculture has been established, but we trust the time is not far distant when text-books on this important and practical subject will be introduced.

## PRINTING DEPARTMENT.

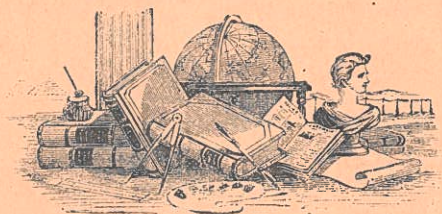
THE COLLEGE owns a good press, which, with its appurtenances is valued at one thousand dollars. Upon it is printed monthly, du-

ring the school year, *The Southern Sentinel*, a paper devoted to intelligent labor and Christian education. It is also designed as a medium of communication between the College and its friends in the North. It is sent *gratis* to all donors desiring it, who contribute five dollars or more. *The Sentinel* is edited by the Faculty and printed by the students. Several have thus learned a good trade and at the same time aided themselves very materially in obtaining an education.

The price of the *Sentinel* is fifty cents a year; clubs at reduced rates. For terms address the Publisher. Some Job Printing is also done, and this is solicited. Four young men who are practical printers, or who desire to learn the trade, are wanted in the office another year.

#### GIRL'S INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

THE YOUNG LADIES are here given instruction in the practical duties of house-keeping, in the kitchen and dining room; and are also taught plain sewing and other needle work. Some who desire to pay part of their board-bill in work, can make such arrangements by early application. Such will be credited according to the amount of work done.



## General Information.

### MEMBERSHIP.

FOR MEMBERSHIP in the College, applicants must have good moral character, and upon their first arrival, must present satisfactory testimonials of such character.

Students from other schools must present certificates of honorable dismissal.

Application should be made at least one month before the beginning of the school year. All should be present at the opening of the School, that they may be immediately classified and thus lose no time. Students in regular classes lose their membership when absent one month; while *absence without leave* may forfeit the pupil's right to membership in the Institution.

Those who have not a fixed purpose to improve their minds and an earnest desire to fit themselves for usefulness, should not seek admission, as the presence of such is not tolerated.

Students are not allowed to come or go on the Sabbath. They must, therefore, plan to avoid all travel on that day.

### TEACHING.

By far the best means of support, as well as of doing good, is found in *teaching*. The demand for teachers properly qualified for this work, is usually in excess of the supply; and hence nearly all of those who are sufficiently advanced in scholarship can aid themselves by teaching.

County Superintendents of Schools, and others desirous of securing teachers from this Institution, will favor their own interests by so arranging the sessions of the Public Schools as to have them occur during its summer vacation.

Members of this Institution who may be considered by their Instructors qualified for teaching, will be furnished with certificates stating their qualifications and standing. As a means of protection from imposition, applicants for schools, claiming to be from Talladega College, should be required to present such certificates.

## MUSIC.

The natural taste of our scholars for music is one of our best means of influence.

Excellent advantages are offered for study and drill in both Instrumental and Vocal Music. Lessons are given upon the piano and Organ. The *College Choir* and *Glee Class*, besides private classes, present unusual advantages for vocal culture.

## LIBRARY, APPARATUS, AND READING ROOM.

About four hundred volumes have been received this year from friends in the North. This beginning we trust may develop into a library of a size and quality indispensable in an Institution of this kind.

The College is in possession of a small philosophical apparatus and laboratory, the gift of northern friends.

A beginning has been made in the establishment of a Reading room. We hope to make it much more a means of improvement during the coming year.

## EXPENSES.

"Per month" means four weeks or twenty-eight days, and not the calendar month.

All needed text books can be bought *at cost* at the college, and students should come prepared to get them. They are sold for cash only.

*All payments are to be made in advance on the first day of each month.* Students who fall behind in their accounts a half month, are *liable to suspension from recitations* until they pay, or make other satisfactory arrangements.

All old accounts must be settled before entering school for another year.

Money deposited for board, tuition, and books, cannot be drawn out and used for other purposes.

All boarders are required to work for the Institution at least one hour per day. This requirement makes the above low charges possible.

Remittances in payment of bills should be made by money-orders, drafts, in registered letters, or by express. Make money orders and drafts payable to GEO. N. ELLIS, Treasurer, and address all moneys to him. Receipts will be promptly returned.

## REGULATIONS.

As it is the aim of the Institution to promote good scholarship and Christian character, the following regulations have been adopted, calculated to secure these results:

Students are not allowed to use intoxicating liquors.

The use of tobacco in any form upon the College premises, or in other places, is prohibited.

All profanity, playing at cards, or billiards, and everything tending to immorality of life, are strictly forbidden.

Cleanliness of rooms and person is required.

Regular and punctual attendance upon all hours for study and recitation, and upon the established religious exercises of the Institution, is expected; as also entire and cheerful obedience to its regulations, and to the officers of the same.

The government of the Institution is designed to be moral and conciliatory. It will be strict and impartial.

Students, so far as possible, are thrown upon their own behavior, appeal being made to their own sense of justice and propriety, and their principles of honor—and they *are understood, on entering, to pledge themselves to obey all the regulations of the Institution.*

## RELIGIOUS.

Students are required to attend the following Religious exercises: Church service and Sabbath School on the Sabbath, daily prayers at their boarding places, and in the morning at the Chapel.

## AIMS.

The advantages and privileges of the INSTITUTION are offered to all

of either sex, without regard to sect, race, color, or nationality.

It aims to furnish a thorough education, under the best methods of instruction, in a sufficiently wide range of studies, securing a substantial preparation for professional duties, teaching, or general business.

It aims to secure the best development of social character, by bringing students of both sexes, from various localities, under the same general discipline, occupying separate buildings, yet constituting one family; associating in school and religious exercises, and in the dining-hall, under the constant oversight of the teachers.

Above all, it claims to be an institution of *Christian* learning. It stands upon the broadest possible basis, and is in no respect *sectarian*.

It is designed to make the Institution, so far as possible, a *home* for those who attend. Parents and guardians may rest assured that any youth placed under the care of the Instructors will be their especial charge, and that the rules of good conduct will be at all times enforced.

#### WANTS.

Without State aid, and relying entirely on the gifts of the benevolent, the College has need of many things, and these wants may be summarized as follows:

1. Clothing, books and papers for our Library and Sunday Schools, and supplies for the Industrial Department. Outgrown and partially worn clothing for all ages and both sexes, is of great service in our work. Poverty appears on every side, and some of our students need to be clothed, as well as taught. In disposing of these benefactions, our effort is, not to promote mendicancy, but so to extend help, as to develop self-help. Ordinarily this clothing is paid for in work, or sold at a nominal price, and the funds thus secured, are expended in purchasing other needed articles. Cotton and other cloth which can be made up in the Sewing Room, is solicited. The Farm, which may be made a chief factor in economic and industrial education, has been lately purchased and is in need of stock, implements, and buildings. Any inclined to help in this department, are requested to correspond with the Farm Superintendent, Mr. A. A. Southwick, or the President.

Books are needed, for both the College and the Theological Library, and Illustrated papers are requested for the numerous Sunday Schools taught by our students and graduates. Sunday School Libraries and music books are of service in these dark and destitute places.

2. Student aid is a necessity. The charges for board and room are made as small as possible, yet but few, from their own resources, are able to meet these necessary expenses. Nearly all require some help, and many require a great deal. Often from fifty to seventy dollars are needed to supplement a student's resources and keep him in College a year. This aid is extended only to the worthy, and perhaps there is no surer, or quicker way of doing good, than by thus helping some promising student into a life of usefulness.

3. The Building Fund should be increased. Something has been added to the fifteen thousand received from the Stone Estate, but the total thus far received, is not enough to complete the Dormitory, refit Swayne Hall, and do other necessary building and repairing. Eight thousand dollars more are needed for expenditure this season, and gifts, large and small; are requested for this purpose.

4. Stone Hall must be furnished. Forty rooms will each need a stove, chairs, table, lamp, bed and bedding, wardrobe, wash-stand, bowl, pitcher and slop pail. Twenty-five dollars is a small estimate for a room; and the aggregate for this purpose is not less than one thousand dollars.

5. Besides the above for the present emergency, the school now becoming in fact, as in name, a College, needs permanent funds, the interest of which may be a source of constant supply. A College cannot always live from hand to mouth, nor meet the expenses of each year, by yearly solicitation. At present the College has no endowment for any purpose whatever. A small sum should be invested for the increase of the Library, and endowments are required for the salary of Professors and Teachers. This object is commended for the bequests of those who cannot give to it while living. The legal name of the corporation, is "Talladega College, Talladega, Ala."

#### LOCATION.

The College is at Talladega, among the foot-hills of the Blue Ridge, and has rare advantages in climate and scenery. On the Selma, Rome and Dalton Railroad, it has easy access to all parts of the State, yet is far enough removed from the great cotton belt, to escape the malaria and more intense heat of that region. The buildings stand on high ground, shaded with trees, about half a mile from the village and surrounded with distant ranges of hills. For beauty of location,

and healthfulness of climate, Talladega College cannot be surpassed by any institution in the South.

#### MISCELLANEOUS.

Each pupil should bring a Bible. It is needed for private reading, for the Sunday School, and for the weekly Bible lesson.

All should be provided with *warm* clothing. Young ladies should bring water-proof, rubbers, and umbrella.

Economy and good taste demand plain and simple clothing.

Parents are urged to co-operate with teachers in seeing that none other is worn.

Letters should be addressed to Talladega College, Talladega, Ala.

A long experience has proved that much evil comes from pupils receiving food from home. It is best they should not receive it. *Friends, therefore, will please not send it.*

Pupils who do not board at their homes, are not allowed to board out of the Institution, except by special permission obtained before coming.

Boarders are expected to furnish their own towels.
