From the Archives

Baseball legend Henry Louis "Hank" Aaron passed away on January 22, 2021 at the age of 86.

An Alabama native, born in Mobile, and with family ties to Talladega, Aaron retired from baseball in 1976 having been the first player to break Babe Ruth's home run record. In 1974 he surpassed Ruth's 714 home run record and by 1976 he would have hit a career total of 755, a record that stood for thirty-three years. He would go on to receive the Spingarn Medal in 1976. was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1982, was awarded the Presidential Citizens Medal in 2001, and received his honorary doctorate from Princeton in 2011.

Notably, Aaron would go on to speak on behalf of and dedicate his post-baseball-related works towards giving back to HBCUs and the community foundations that support them. Talladega College in particular is the recipient of the Hank Aaron Chasing the Dream Scholarship, maintained by the eponymous Hank Aaron Chasing the Dream Foundation. In 2013 alone the foundation donated \$104,000 in scholarships to Talladega College. Below is a photograph with Mr. and Mrs. Aaron, President Hawkins. During the 2013 Commencement Ceremony, both Hank and Bilye Aaron were conferred as honorary doctorates of humanities and letters from Talladega College.
